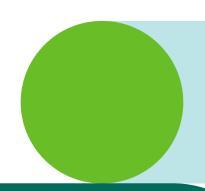






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Message from our Board Chair & CEO



Springboard's 2024-25 fiscal year has been a very special one, as we celebrated our 50th anniversary throughout 2024 and into 2025. We completed the first year of our five-year Strategic Plan with many successes. We made significant enhancements to our core programs and services to support our program participants. Collaborating with other service providers, we have made meaningful contributions to system changes and transformations initiated by our government partners.

Over the last 51 years, Springboard has continued to evolve from our humble beginnings as a transportation service that allowed families to visit their incarcerated loved ones into the multi-faceted organization we are today. As a multi-service agency, we provide services on an integrated basis for people with developmental disabilities to learn to live as independently as possible, employment supports and training for people facing barriers to employment, youth and adult justice services for people who have come into conflict with the law, and a digital learning platform – The Community Learning HUB – provides facilitated training for youth and adults across Canada.

In 2024-25 we reached over 10,000+ individuals through 40 programs. Springboard was successful in making some tremendous achievements this past year, including:

- Redeveloped our website and related communications initiatives and materials.
- Completed year one of a five-year Strategic Plan.

- Received Rental Housing Supply Program funds from the City of Toronto to redevelop our 976 College St. site into affordable housing units for people with developmental disabilities.
- Opened our 51 Dawes Rd. property to support individuals with complex developmental and behavioural needs.

- Strengthened our data and evaluation capacity through our Internal Evaluation Committee.
- Completed enhanced DEI training and continued to review policies and practices using a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion lens.
- Completed year one of our new Employment Services contract with WCG, the new Service System Manager, reaching our targets.
- Completed an organizational structural review and commenced implementing the recommendations.
- Continued developing new programs on a feefor-services basis for people with developmental disabilities.

Springboard has continued to work in partnership with other service providers as we further the Journey to Belonging transformation in Developmental Services. A big thank you to the staff for their hard work and dedication in meeting the needs of the program participants and for their ability and willingness to adapt to the changing landscape. As well, thank you to the Union Executive for working constructively with management towards effective programs and services.

Highlights from the Board:

- Exercised leadership in the support and oversight of the first year in our five-year strategic plan.
- Completed a committee structure review to ensure effectiveness and implemented recommended actions.
- Provided support and advice in connection with the redevelopment of our 976 College St. site.
- Provided good governance and acted in support of the Board's succession plan, including implementing term limits, recruiting new Board Directors and establishing plans for Board Executive positions and Committee Chairs.

Springboard provides robust services to the clients and communities we support. We thank all our funders – government partners, corporations, foundations and individual donors – for their support of our services and programs. Thanks, too, to our partners for their generosity in sharing resources and working collaboratively with us towards a common goal.

Our History



Springboard was formed by volunteers and former offenders to help keep families together during a period of incarceration, primarily through transportation and counselling.

Incorporated in 1974 as a non-profit charitable organization, Springboard has continually evolved to support Toronto's neighbourhoods and surrounding communities. While its early work focused on helping individuals involved in the justice system, the organization soon grew to include people with developmental disabilities, offering housing and programs that foster independence and personal growth.

Over the years, Springboard expanded its services to provide employment programs for youth and adults facing barriers, including those with a criminal record, new immigrants or anyone seeking to develop new skills for meaningful work.

Today, the organization reaches communities across Canada through the Community Learning HUB, a digital life skills platform offering modules used by social service organizations nationwide. Springboard's Community Learning HUB is a digital learning platform offering highly interactive, facilitator-led, educational programming that supports youth and young adults. The Community Learning HUB works with social service organizations, educational institutions, and youth justice agencies across Ontario to develop and deliver community-based programming for traditionally barriered youth and adult populations.

> With more than 50 life-skills modules across the digital platform, the HUB offers learning modules on financial literacy, anger management, emotional regulation, healthy relationships, mindfulness, employment and digital wellbeing. Our programs are evidence-based and use a positive youth development framework to enhance health, resilience, leadership and inclusion for youth and adult learners.

MODULE PUBLICATIONS

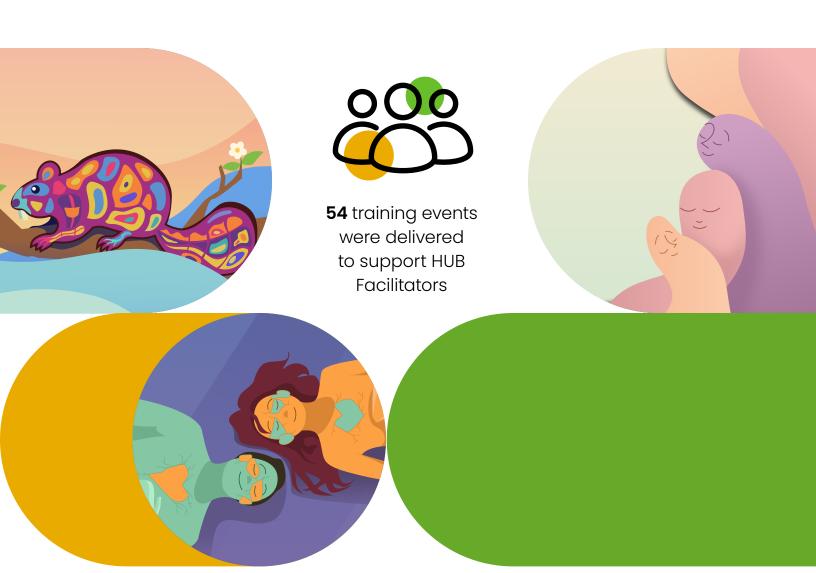
During the 2024–2025 year, the Community Learning HUB team designed and published three additional modules to the platform in our Anger Management and Moving Towards Harmony programs. Those modules included:

- Anger Management and Emotional Resilience: Non-Violent Communication
- Anger Management and Emotional Resilience: **Empathetic Communication**
- Moving Towards Harmony: Wisdom Through Connection

The new content was added to the Peace & Justice section of the platform, and the HUB continued to see usage in this specific content area grow throughout the fiscal year. You can see some of the incredible artwork developed by our talented designers for these modules in this annual report.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT & PARTNERSHIPS

The HUB team was able to offer some exciting Professional Development activities for our Community of Practice this year. At the beginning of the fiscal year, the Community of Practice welcomed an impactful learning experience from Cordie Mundele, who was a guest speaker hosted by the HUB for professional development training related to the upcoming release of our Moving Towards My Best Self modules. This training was designed to equip facilitators with knowledge and tools to offer Afrocentric programming. The emphasis was on cultivating positive selftalk, nurturing self-determination and integrating cultural sensitivity to effectively address the distinctive challenges faced by Black girls, with the ultimate goal of promoting resilience.

In November and December, the Community
Learning HUB also had the incredible experience
of partnering with the Canadian Mental Health
Association to host two harm-reduction training
sessions with the goal of empowering professionals,
including youth justice workers, educators and
other frontline staff who support youth navigating
substance use. The training equips facilitators with
trauma-informed, compassionate approaches
that prioritize non-judgment and respect for each
individual's autonomy.

The workshops were extremely well received by the HUB's Community of Practice and provided the opportunity for 54 facilitators to learn about tools to implement harm-reduction strategies effectively, and how to foster environments where individuals can make informed choices within their communities and institutions.

Finally, throughout the year, Springboard continued to work closely with Nishnawbe-Aski Legal Services (NAN Legal) to strengthen HUB program delivery and gather feedback to ensure our curriculum is culturally responsive and relevant to Indigenous youth across the Nishnawbe Aski Nation (NAN), which serves 49 Indigenous communities in Northern Ontario This year's partnership activities included collaborative development of the curriculum for an updated module series on substance awareness programming, collaboration on a new curriculum series on healthy boundaries in the digital space, and general consultation on areas of feedback and growth for the HUB platform. Springboard remains humbled to work alongside NAN Legal to support their meaningful delivery of services to NAN youth.

115 trained active facilitators delivered HUB programming to youth from across 45 different social service sites

TECHNOLOGICAL INNOVATION

As part of our ongoing commitment to making HUB programs as accessible as possible, our talented team of developers is currently working on an exciting new technology feature for the platform. The Offline HUB project development began during this fiscal year and once completed it will allow our partners with restricted or unreliable internet access to facilitate HUB programming in an offline environment. This project arose from feedback from community partners who operate in rural and remote Ontario communities, as well as from HUB facilitators working in secure youth custody facilities with minimal internet access. The Offline HUB project is an innovative solution which will provide enhanced support for HUB facilitators working to empower learners across the province.



Springboard's Developmental Services (DS) programs support people with developmental disabilities (many of whom have a dual diagnosis) to participate fully in community life. The following programs provide knowledge and skills development as well as activities to maximize participants' independence and well-being.

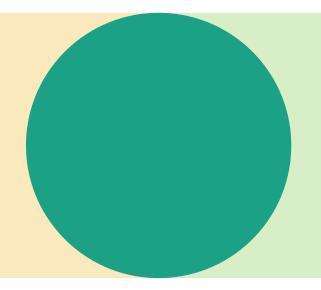

SEEKING OPPORTUNITIES ACCESSING RESOURCES (SOAR) – SPECIAL EVENTS

SOAR has had a very exciting year filled with many different events! This summer we gathered together at Thompson Memorial Park to enjoy our annual participant BBQ. Everyone had a great time savouring hot dogs, hamburgers, and tasty sides, all while listening to good music and catching up with friends. It was a warm and lively day where old friends and new faces shared smiles, made memories and truly felt the sense of community. Later this summer we celebrated Caribana with an amazing performance by steel pan artist LOVESOUND. Participants joyfully danced and sang along to a vibrant mix of Caribbean music styles like soca, reggae and steel pan covers. The event was colourful, with many bringing flags from their Caribbean countries to represent their cultures. SOAR also facilitated a Caribbean-themed cooking class where participants got to make roti with curry chicken and potatoes. It's been a fantastic journey of fun, music, culture and connection.

COMMUNITY INTEGRATION & EMPLOYMENT SPECIALIST

This year we were able to introduce a new role: a Community Integration & Employment Specialist (CIES), in collaboration with the Employment Services team. This role was created to strengthen the financial stability of adults with developmental disabilities through comprehensive training and support in obtaining paid employment opportunities. Thank you to the Bedolfe Foundation for their generous grant that will support Ready, Set, Work, a key component of this role. This role will support individuals in our homes and community programs with obtaining employment: not only for financial stability and independence, but for enhancing their own personal fulfillment, quality of life and social inclusion.



GARDENING PROGRAM

With the support of the Harry E. Foster Charitable Foundation, our Developmental Services programs were able to provide gardening programs to our supported individuals this summer. Gardening is a meaningful activity with numerous physical, psychological, cognitive and social benefits including gentle exercise, enhanced motor skills, improved physical strength and sensory engagement. The goal of this program was to transform our underutilized backyard spaces into accessible, vibrant and welcoming spaces that encourages outdoor engagement for the individuals we support. We installed raised planter beds in the backyard to make gardening accessible for all. These beds include a mix of vegetables, herbs, and flowers. The backyard now includes individual seating areas with Adirondack chairs and a welcoming patio table and bench seating, accented by colourful flowers and string lighting along the fence to make the space inviting even in the evenings. Planters were also added to the front yard to brighten the home's exterior. The result is a beautiful, functional backyard that is actively enjoyed by the supported individuals. They now spend more time outdoors, whether eating lunch, colouring at the patio table, or simply relaxing in the Adirondack chairs. Residents rotate watering responsibilities, and everyone celebrated during our end of summer BBQ, harvesting homegrown peppers from the vegetable garden!

Highlights

EMPLOYMENT ONTARIO PROGRAMS

Springboards Employment Services, Youth Job Connection and Youth Job Connection Summer programs supported more than 1,100 participants by providing individualized support to help job seekers prepare for, secure and retain meaningful employment, while also connecting employers with skilled candidates. Services include career planning, job search preparation, job matching, placement opportunities and retention supports, as well as access to Better Jobs Ontario (BJO) for those in need of retraining to enter in-demand fields. Together, these services help clients overcome barriers and move toward long-term career success.

The Canada-Ontario Job Grant program supported two employers by providing training to nine employees to further their skill development, secure employment and receive promotions and increased wages.

DIGITAL MEDIA PROGRAMS

Through Springboard's continued partnership with the City of Toronto and the RBC Foundation, Springboard's Digital Media programs were successful in empowering and equipping diverse participants with in-demand skills through the Learn 2 Earn program. A total of 61 participants graduated from the program after receiving skills training and development in digital media e-commerce, including audio/visual, video and podcasting, website development, graphic design and social media platforms. Graduates also had the opportunity to receive Digital Marketing certificates from Netplus College.

CITY OF TORONTO - EMPLOYMENT ESSENTIALS AND WRAP PROGRAMS

Springboard's Employment Essentials and WRAP programs, funded by the City of Toronto, resulted in 81 Ontario Works participants receiving support in addressing pre-employment needs and overcoming individual barriers to move closer to employment. Through collaboration with community partners, participants also built their support networks to stay connected to health and social resources in the community.

INTERDEPARTMENTAL COLLABORATION - FOCUS

The Employment Services department continued collaboration with the Youth Justice staff on the Furthering Our Communities Uniting Services (FOCUS) tables, led by the City of Toronto, United Way, and Toronto Police Service. Through weekly meetings, the table raises individuals who are at an increased level of risk, in order to provide timely and coordinated support. This collaboration resulted in more than 25 individuals receiving employment services and wraparound community supports referrals through our programs.

Guided by principles of equity and anti-oppression, we support or work with youth and adults as they take meaningful steps forward, helping them feel seen, supported, and empowered to thrive.

Highlights

This year, Justice Services continued to deepen our focus on inclusion by expanding community-based supports, strengthening cross-sector partnerships and centering the voices of people with lived experience. Across all of our programs, our team worked to create spaces where individuals are respected, supported and able to move forward in ways that matter to them.

INCLUSIVE JUSTICE COLLABORATIVE

Through our Inclusive Justice Collaborative – a five-year, systems innovation project funded by the Youth Opportunities Fund – we have been working alongside community and system partners to improve outcomes for Black and racialized neurodivergent youth involved in the justice system. This work is grounded in relationships and accountability, with a focus on reducing barriers, building trust and shifting systems that too often cause harm.

YOUTH JUSTICE CENTRE SATELLITE

We are preparing for the launch of our Youth Justice Centre satellite at our Attendance Centre, as part of the Ministry of the Attorney General's expansion of the Northwest Justice Centre model. These centres are grounded in the belief that justice involvement is a community issue, and so community must be part of the solution. They bring together multi-sector supports to help youth address the underlying factors contributing to justice involvement, disrupt cycles of harm and strengthen community safety. At our site, youth will be supported in reconnecting to education, developing life skills, building healthy relationships and accessing mental-health and substance-use supports.

INCREASING CAPACITY AT OUR OPEN CUSTODY **DETENTION PROGRAM**

Terry Fox House returned to full capacity this year, welcoming more youth into our open custody and detention program. With increased referrals and greater demand for intensive supports, the team remained grounded in relational, trauma-informed approaches. Staff continued to create a stable, consistent environment where youth can reflect, build skills and begin planning for what comes next.

YOUTH-ADULT ALLYSHIP WITH STUDENTS **COMMISSION OF CANADA**

Our partnership with the Students Commission of Canada helped us strengthen youth voice and youth-adult allyship across our community-based youth programs. This year-long collaboration brought youth directly into the process of shaping priorities, language, sharing feedback and supporting decision-making. It pushed us to re-examine our role and stay grounded in what it means to walk alongside youth, rather than leading from ahead. The year culminated with a tailored, program-specific youth engagement plan, to ensure youth voice is embedded in all programs in an ongoing and sustainable way.

EXPANDING OUR COMMUNITY SERVICE ORDER (CSO) FOOTPRINT

This year also marked major growth in our Community Service Order program as we were successful in our Request for Proposal, which secured our program reach across the Peel, York, Halton and Toronto regions. Through this expansion, we were able to support more adults in completing meaningful community service placements that align with their strengths and interests. The program continues to provide an important means of working towards reparation, by helping participants meet their obligations while building positive connections in their communities.

Our teams across Justice Services have continued to show up with compassion and humility in how we engage with those we serve. Whether supporting someone through reintegration, helping a young person re-engage with school or guiding someone through an accountability process, we have seen the impact of showing up with care and without judgment.

We remain committed to learning and growing alongside the people we support. Each of these initiatives reflects our belief that real inclusion is built through both policy and practice. Our work this year has been grounded in the idea that when people feel seen, supported, and empowered, they are more likely to thrive.

"I dealt with the Adult Justice Workers. who were so amazing. Not only dealing with me with total professionalism, but also how to deal with my problem which I could not do on my own. The Adult Justice Worker showed so much empathy and understanding that they felt like an older sister helping me. Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

We continue to build a culture of belonging where diverse perspectives and individual experiences are respected and celebrated. Our commitment to DEI is central to how we work and grow as an organization.

In 2024-25, we completed organization-wide DEI training delivered by our community partner, ROOTS Community Services. Building on this foundation, we are developing a DEI Champions initiative. These champions will actively lead, support and promote DEI within their teams and across departments, serving as catalysts to embed inclusive practices into our daily culture.





Employee Engagement & Development

At Springboard, employee engagement and development are centred on creating meaningful opportunities for staff to contribute, feel valued, and stay connected to the organization.

In 2024-25, survey results reflected the strong impact of these efforts:

- Across three Town Halls in 2024, nearly all respondents (96-100%) reported feeling more informed about Springboard's 2024-29 Strategic & Operations Plan and Board updates. In June, 95% also noted stronger connections with both Springboard and their colleagues, with breakout sessions receiving a satisfaction score of 4/5.
- Following the annual Staff Event, 86% of attendees reported stronger connections with colleagues and 78% with Springboard overall. Attendees highlighted meaningful opportunities for learning and reflection, reinforcing the event's role in building community and belonging.

Additionally, ongoing union engagement remains a cornerstone of our culture, ensuring diverse perspectives are reflected in planning and decision-making.

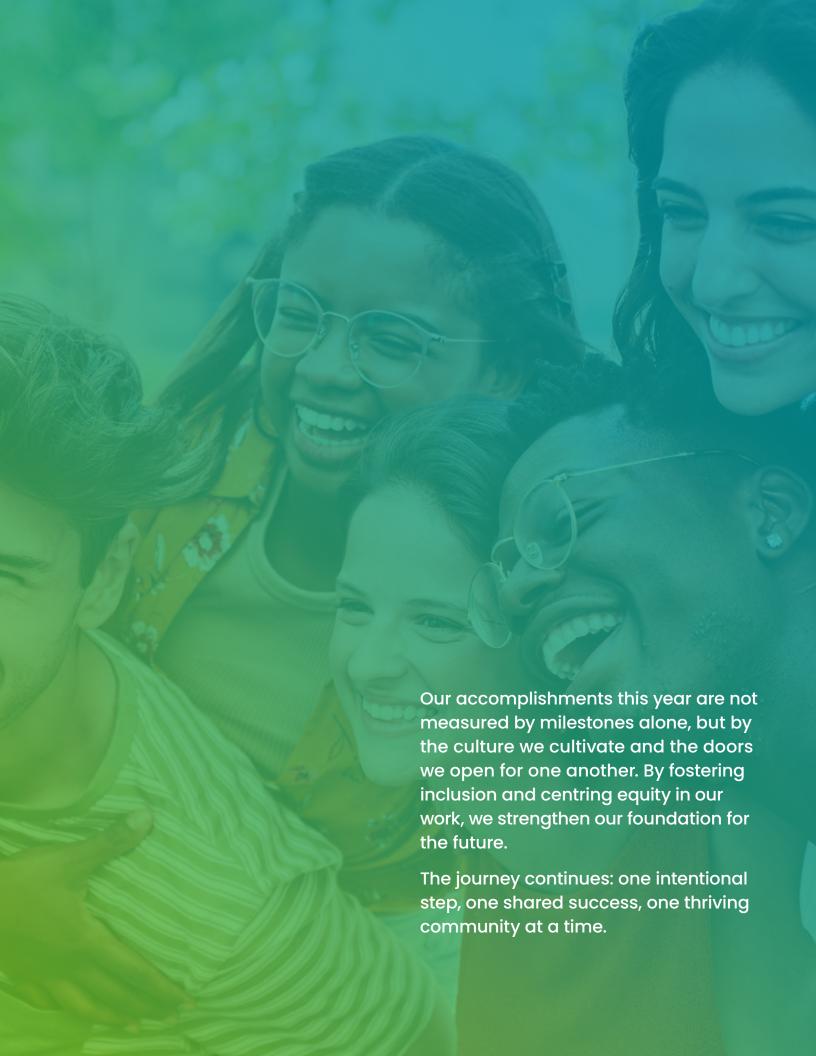
